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

In the last quarter of 2008, auction houses and galleries alike saw the most notable reduction in sales since the 1991-1992 market plunge; reports state that art prices actually declined 7.5 percent when compared with the fourth quarter of 2007. What does this mean for appraisers as we analyze the art market depression? Is there an across the board devaluation formula that can be applied to assess art market values? What is the expected market turnaround time? The 2009 National Conference has put together an extraordinary assembly of experts to shed light on these and other important issues.
